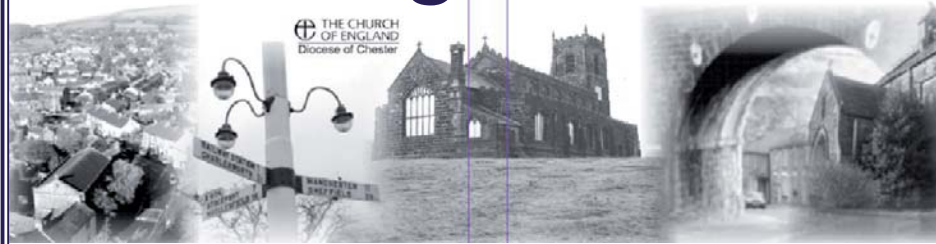

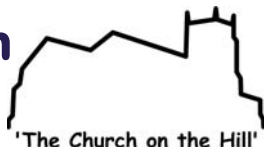

James Writes



In Our Hands...

Over the last 3 months, we've been exploring the events of the 'Protestant Reformation' – enormous changes which came upon the Church and society 500 years ago. It's been brilliant to explore the stories of key players and their books (in our three public lectures), to be encouraged by the truths re-discovered by the Reformers (which we've preached about on Sundays) and to watch all the many different programmes and documentaries the TV has brought to us as well.

There are so many things I could say in reflecting on the whole subject, but perhaps the dominant idea has been the concern for the Christian faith to be put into the hands of ordinary believers.

Martin Luther, William Tyndale and so many others laboured to have the bible translated from Latin into the normal languages of their countries – putting the Bibles in ordinary believers' hands.

Thomas Cranmer (England's first protestant archbishop) was willing to put up with all kinds of political compromise and humiliation in order to press through his chief project – getting prayers and a liturgy into English, into regular use, and so into ordinary believers' hands (the fruit of his labours is essentially what we still call the Book of Common Prayer and use in some of our services today).

And so, with that in mind, we want to try out something new from January – an

opportunity to get the Bible more into our own hands: the Bible Book Club.

It is exactly what the name suggests: a book club, running monthly (from January-April to begin with – it can carry on if it works!) where everyone joining in reads the same book from the Bible (in their own time) then comes together to have a chat about it. It won't particularly be a carefully led conversation, but simply exploring questions like: what did you make of it, any surprises, parts you found difficult, what's it all about? And then, the next month, we'll pick another one and read that.

Everyone will be in the same boat – we'll all have read the same book – and it's a great chance to get talking about what the bible books say. We'd love people to join together with a small number of others (say, 4-6 people in total) so that everyone gets a chance to share their point of view. And we're not particularly looking for 'leaders' – it's really just a conversation to be had between friends.

If you're interested, look out for opportunities to sign up very soon in the new year – and if you think you'd be willing to 'host' a group (that's offering your house for about an hour once a month and perhaps providing tea & coffee), I'd love to hear from you.

Let me urge you to give it some thought over the Christmas period – and let's get the Bible into our own hands.

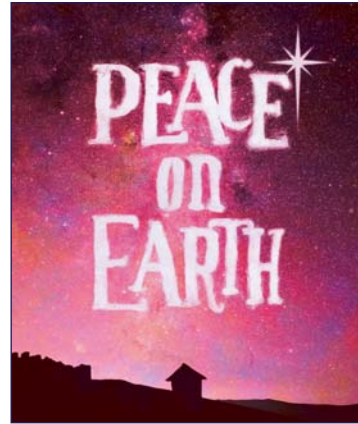

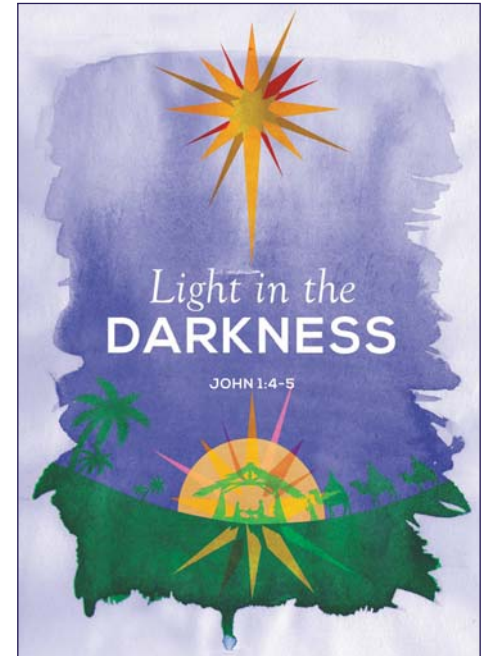

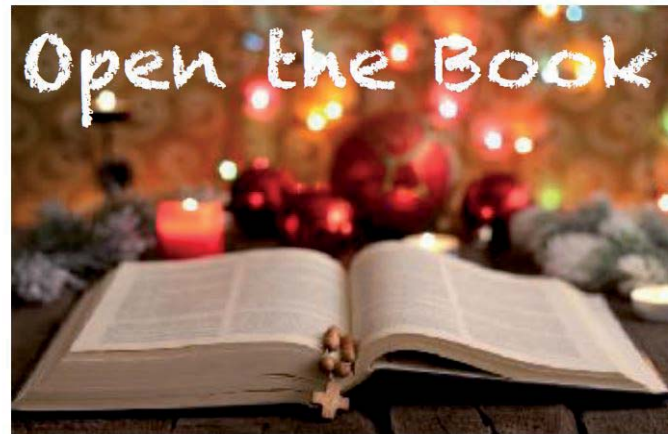

UNREST!



The Magdalene Centre recently hosted a remarkable and moving film - shown to a full house of interested people from around Tameside, health professionals and ME sufferers and their families. The showing was organised by the families of Ellissa Bryant and Ursula Humphreys, who both have ME. Also present was Steve Pleasant MBE, who wrote in his recent Chief Exec brief to all Tameside Council and CCG staff:



"I don't pretend to know a great deal about the illness but its impact has been really brought home to me by one of our colleagues, Carol Bryant, whose daughter, Ellissa, has been struck down by it."

Tameside families affected by M.E. are hosting a community screening of *Unrest*, a multi award-winning film by Jennifer Brea, at The Magdalene Centre in Broadbottom. I will be going along to find out more and wanted to also give that opportunity to you.

Ellissa, a talented climber who represented her country, explained to me why the film is so important. In her own words she said "The daily suffering that I go through cannot be understood simply by description – it has to be seen to be believed, recognised and acknowledged. That's why this film is so important." "



Ellissa attended in her wheelchair, – Ursula was too unwell to make it, but recorded a video message.

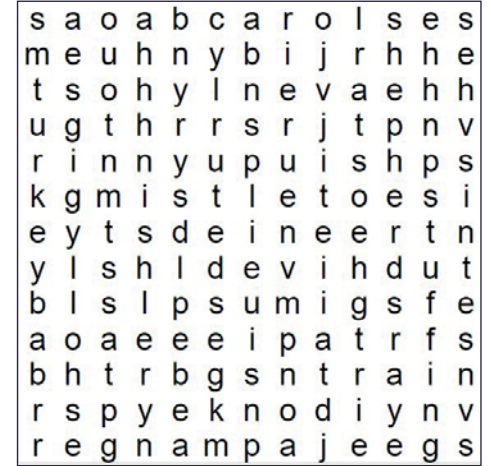
As we reported last month: CFS/ME affects all types of people at all ages – severe fatigue, painful muscles and joints, disordered sleep, gastric disturbances, poor memory and concentration are commonplace. In many cases, onset is linked to a viral infection. Other triggers may include an operation or an accident, although some people experience a slow, insidious onset.

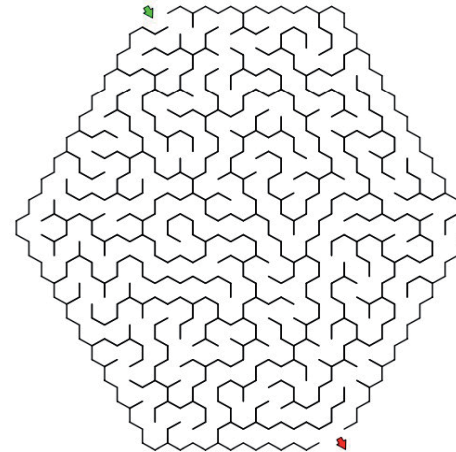

A visit from the Street Pastors

In October, following Afternoon Tea at the Magdalene Centre, we enjoyed a talk from one of the Stalybridge Street Pastor team. You might remember one of our congregation trained to be a pastor with them some years ago.



Who are they?

The Stalybridge Street Pastors started in the town centre in 2010. It didn't take long for them to become established in the town, and for people to accept and welcome what they do. They are a team of over 20 trained volunteers from local churches, out on Friday nights until 10pm and Saturday nights until 3am, wearing blue uniforms with a Hi Viz logo so you shouldn't miss them! They include people of all ages - from 20 - 80!

What do they do?



Their aim is to care, listen and offer practical help to anybody who is in need. Most people are out for a good time but sometimes can get into difficulty. Whether it is an ear to listen when you need to talk, an arm to lean on when it is hard to walk or a lollipop to cheer you up – the pastors are there to help. One thing they have become well known for is giving out flip flops to young women who have ditched their high heels, and thus preventing foot injuries on broken glass!

They are not there to preach, but have plenty of opportunities to talk about their faith and to pray with people when asked.

Why do they do this?

As representatives of local churches from all denominations, they provide a non-judgmental, practical expression of the love of God, through caring, listening and helping. They are a Christian presence on the streets where least expected.

How could I be involved?

- Pray for a Street Pastor on the nights they go out - be a prayer pastor!
- Volunteer – you'll receive excellent training.
- Tell your friends about what they do.

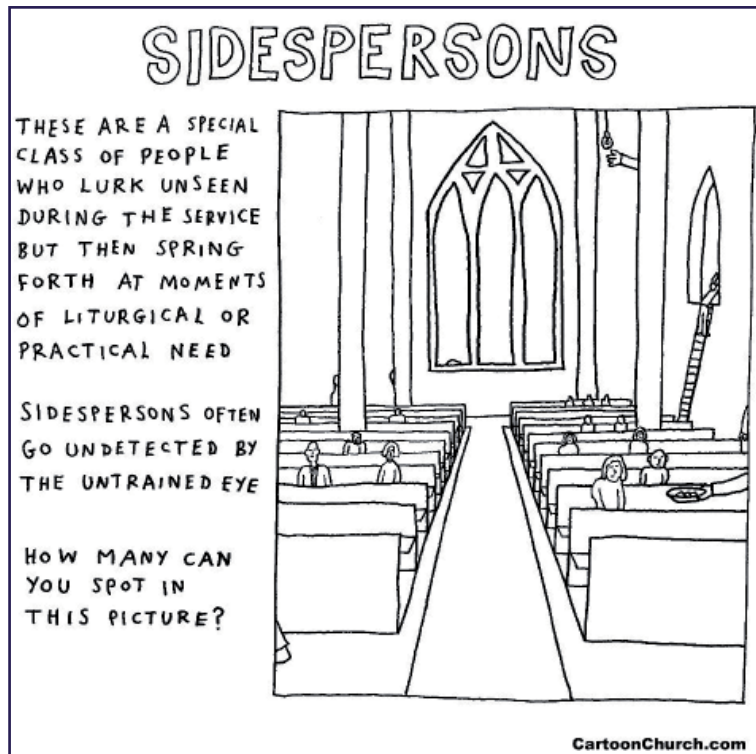

There's something about Mary...

Anthony Billington of the LICC (London Institute for Contemporary Christianity) pays tribute to the mother of Jesus.

The angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call Him Jesus. He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give Him the throne of His father David, and He will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; His kingdom will never end.'

'How will this be,' Mary asked the angel, 'since I am a virgin?' (Luke 1:30-34)

While it has always been possible to make too much of Mary, it has been all too easy to make too little of her. Because, even if she is not an object of faith, she is an example of faith. And a very real example too.

Her story is elaborated in later Christian literature and art, with accounts of her own miraculous birth and childhood, accompanied by regular angelic visitations. Annunciation scenes sometimes portray Mary as reading Scripture or praying, or spinning purple thread for the temple veil – none of which is found in the gospels.

Instead, like the fishermen and tax collectors who would be called, her heavenly encounter comes in the midst of everyday life – as an ordinary Galilean girl engaged to be married to Joseph. And, like the rest of us would

be, she's surprised and scared by the arrival of Gabriel.

Her response to his message is just as human, and wonderfully real. Faced with the increasingly amazing announcement – child, then son, then great, then Son of the Most High, then king, then eternal – Mary is frozen back at step one. A child? She's young, but she's not stupid; she knows how babies are made, and she knows she's

not been with a man. And so she says: 'How will this be, since I am a virgin?' No deep theological question. No amazing insight. No request for a sign. And no objection: 'I am the Lord's servant... May your word to me be fulfilled' (Luke 1:38).

It's a staggering response. Her reputation would be at

stake, and her husband-to-be might want nothing more to do with her. She will play out something of the scandal of the gospel in her very self, and yet consents to do so as a servant of the Lord. She believes the word that is spoken to her, even if she doesn't fully understand it, and her trust exercises itself in submission.

Then, as her story goes on, faith and obedience will give rise to joyful singing and quiet reflection – all appropriate responses of ordinary, everyday servants of God since, at Christmastime and all times.

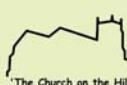
