



No Christian is solitary...

I've written here before about the Church as a family, but at this time of year – between All Saints Day (November 1st) and the start of Advent - we typically remember that, through faith, we become members of a company of believers who belong to each other, even through death.

We remind ourselves of men and women in whose lives the Church - throughout time and space – has seen the grace of God powerfully at work. Sometimes that has been in extraordinary circumstances, sometimes in the very ordinary of everyday.

Our own Memorial Service (on 5th November) and the traditional Remembrance Day events give us further opportunities for the same thing – to remember those known to us, or from our own community, who gave themselves to the Lord's work in life, or for our freedom in valiant death.

Redemption is always a work of God's grace, it is God who redeems us in Christ and there is nothing to be done beyond what Christ has done. So, I find this a slightly strange season. It's a time of remembering, and that often brings sadness (amongst so many other emotions). But the greatest remembering is that we are part of one great family, all crying out in praise of our extraordinary God. As Charles Wesley wrote:

though now divided by the stream,
the narrow stream of death.





The Bells, the Bells...


or... Silent Night in the Belfry

Back in our September issue, we showed the bellringers cleaning out the tower ready for the installation of the new bell simulator. Well – it's now been installed!

The new equipment means that new ringers can now be trained up without making any sound outside the ringing chamber, even though they really will be pulling

the ropes and swinging the real bells at the top of the tower.

Before a training session, the clappers on the bells are tied up, so that they don't make any sound.



Sensors fixed to the bell wheels detect when the bells are swung, and electronic signals are sent down cables to the ringing room, where they are connected to a laptop computer. The laptop will make the sound of the ringing inside the room.

The system can be set up so that one or more ringers can be accompanied by a 'virtual' ringing team. Also, they can be guided on-screen through any number of pre-programmed 'changes' – that is, the bell-ringing tunes we are used to hearing – for example Kent Treble Bob Major.

For those of you who love the sound of our ancient bells, don't worry – they'll still be ringing out on Wednesday practise nights and calling us to worship on Sundays!

Parkinson's...

Richard shares his own experience and reflects on this condition...

“Parkinson’s”, the neurologist said to Bernice as I walked down the hospital corridor.

While it was a relief to know what was the matter, it still came as a shock. My initial reaction was, ‘What had I done to deserve this?’; ‘Why did God allow it?’; ‘Was I being punished for something I had done?’

I remembered how Jesus had very clearly broken the links between sin and illness or misfortune in the case of the Galileans who were slaughtered by Pilate. (Luke 13, 1–5) *“Were these Galileans worse sinners than all the other Galileans because they suffered in this way? No... or those eighteen upon whom the tower in Siloam fell and slew them. Do you think they were more guilty than all the others living in Jerusalem? I tell you, No.”*

What is it?

Parkinson’s is a progressive neurological condition that probably originates in the brain. It is caused through lack of the chemical dopamine because some of the nerve cells in the brain that make it have died.

In addition, a common protein, alpha-synuclein, goes rogue, forming sticky toxic masses that jump from cell to cell, killing the nerves as they go. This means that some of the electric circuits in the brain are broken with resulting loss of muscular control.

There are currently no known diagnostic tests that can accurately detect Parkinson’s because it affects people in so many different ways. Some simple signs are the style of walking such as shuffling, or copying a simple line drawing where the lines are no longer straight and firm, or the size of hand writing which in Parkinson’s becomes small.

The Effects

The external symptoms of Parkinson’s are tremor, stiffness and slowness of movement. Anxiety, stress and excitement may make the symptoms more noticeable and every day activities more difficult.



The most obvious symptom is uncontrolled shaking of a limb, ‘dystonia’, caused by muscles contracting when they should relax or when they should not be involved in a movement. This is associated with excessive electrical activity in the brain, which contains inhibitory circuits that should prevent the spread of this into areas that should

be inactive. The brain sends messages to the wrong muscles or with incorrect timing, resulting in twisting or repetitive involuntary movements with development of cramps, aching and fatigue.

There can be loss of control in facial muscles, giving a sad expression. Walking may be unsteady, which can be mistaken for drunkenness. Steps become short and shuffling. Contraction of the muscles causes difficulty in standing for any length of time. Eye muscles can be affected giving jerky eye movement. Blinking less frequently reduces the cleansing effect so the eye may become sore or dry. The sense of smell may be lost.

Through breathing more weakly, the voice may become slurred and lower in tone. The sufferer is not aware how quietly they are speaking, and speaking against other background noise becomes difficult. In a general conversation, the sufferer tends to be left out. Swallowing food may become difficult as well.

Sleep disorders are another sign of Parkinson’s. This may be sort of nightmares, with vivid scenes of being attacked. In self-defence, the sufferer may lash out with their arms or legs or even try to attack a sleeping partner. The sufferer may be totally unaware of what they have been doing.

Parkinson’s in the Bible?

James Parkinson was the first person to write about it, in 1817, in his essay *On the Shaking Palsy*, hence the

name. But it must have existed much earlier, raising the question whether Jesus could have healed at least two people of its clutches.

Luke records the case of the paralysed man lowered through the roof of a house so he could reach Jesus. The Authorised Bible translates this as he was suffering from a ‘palsy’. (Luke 5, 17–26) *“Take up your bed and walk.”*




Then there was the case of the woman crippled for eighteen years by an evil spirit. (Luke 13, 10–17) She lacked strength and also was bent forwards. Muscles become stiff and their movement restricted, hence the bent posture. *“Woman, you are set free.”*

While we should not expect to be healed of our Parkinson’s, perhaps God can use our illness to the good. *“All things work together for them who love God.”* St. Paul tells the Philippians, *“It is God who works in you to will and act according to his good purpose.”* (Phil. 2, 13)

I wonder what God has in store for me with the reduced physical ability that comes with Parkinson’s. I have had to surrender so much. What is left? We are driven back to the love of God for us.

I have learnt much about the wonder of God's creation, particularly the marvel and complexity of the human body. So, "One thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching unto those things which are before, I press forward toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." (Phil. 3, 13-14)

Other People's Perceptions

Most people think that Parkinson's can be cured by treatment but this is not so. They are unaware of the seriousness of the condition and think it is a bit of a joke. They do not understand that it incapacitates so much and is so unpredictable.

Parkinson's certainly has not received the attention and research of say cancer. It is thought that perhaps as many as one person in two hundred may be affected in some way so there is a great need to raise awareness of Parkinson's!






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
