Barriers to learning

- Parental engagement in home reading routines and encouraging reading for pleasure or supporting homework activities is often sporadic for disadvantaged pupils.
- Some of the children who are eligible for pupil premium also have additional needs. Some of these barriers stem from SEN needs which means that interventions here need to be targeted on an individual or small group basis.
- The ability to manage feelings and behaviour is less well established for disadvantaged pupils. Expectations and aspirations are often low.
- External agencies: children's social care and family support workers have historically supported a number of families
- High Deprivation for some of our Pupil Premium children.
 - 37% of pupils reside in the top 10% of the most deprived LSOA's on the Index of Multiple Deprivation
 - 36% of pupils reside in the top 10% of the most deprived LSOA's on the Income Deprivation Affecting Children Index
 - 12% of children reside in the top 10% of most deprived LSOA's in the crime Index of Deprivation
