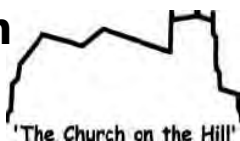

An Important Message from our treasurer Brian Seaborn

Annual Parish Council Meeting on 25 October heard that our church enjoyed an excellent financial year in 2019, reporting a surplus of almost £26,000 – quite a turn round from the £8,900 deficit in 2018. I explained in an earlier article that the surplus was achieved through a combination of fund raising, one-off donations, a slight increase in regular giving, bringing magazine production and grounds maintenance “in-house” and generous legacies.

2020 has turned out to be very different. Our monthly income from all sources is just about covering our running costs (even though gas and electricity bills have been lower for some months) but it’s not enough to pay the parish share or any maintenance costs. The restrictions imposed on us by the coronavirus outbreak are making things worse, just as they are for businesses and individuals.

At present, the gap between income and expenditure is around £5,000 per month. This is not all due to coronavirus but it’s making matters more difficult. We have been using the surplus from 2019 to get by but this is reducing steadily and I expect that our funds will be used by early 2021 unless action is taken now. The new PCC will need to agree a strategy to address this and without doubt it will include an appeal to the congregation for an increase in giving. If you can, please consider an increase in giving, making a donation – or letting any member of the new PCC know of any ideas you might have about fund-raising or other ways of generating income. Rev Cait has already suggested she could run a “virtual marathon” and has ideas about approaching large companies for donations. This has to be part of an agreed plan by the PCC, so please consider what you could do and what we could all do.

We will be in touch with the Diocese about our position but in the meantime, please give thought and prayer to our difficult position. I write this without knowing how the coronavirus affects individuals and I’m sorry if this comes at a difficult time for you. For those who are unable to go further please be assured that we understand.

Remembrance Sunday

8th November

Government restrictions and the ongoing need to contain the spread of covid-19 have made it impossible to organise any of the traditional parades and ceremonies in Tameside this year. As usual, the Civic Mayor will lay a wreath on behalf of the borough at Ashton War Memorial, and wreaths will also be laid in other parts of the borough. None of these will feature more than six guests – invited by the Mayor's office in consultation with the Royal British Legion.

Tameside Council appreciates some members of the public will want to lay wreaths at outdoor memorials, and they are able to do so but they are strongly urged to avoid 11am on either Remembrance Sunday (8th November) or Armistice Day (11th November). Instead, they are asked to find a time between November 8th and 11th to pay their respects quietly and while adhering to covid-19 social-distancing guidelines. The memorial in Mottram Parish church will not be available for this purpose.

There will be NO public Act of Remembrance at St. Michael's Mottram, but wreaths will be laid by specially invited guests. This will be recorded on video, and made available by YouTube.

Our Act of Remembrance recording will be made public as soon as possible once it has taken place.

Royal British Legion Poppy Appeal 2020

Look out for the Poppy Appeal this year, but not so much via street collections. The R.B.L. will focus on contactless donations - a safer system during the pandemic.

One such method will be 'point of sale donations'. This means that when you shop at your supermarket or online, you may be invited to round up your total to the nearest pound to help the Poppy Appeal.

A spokesman for the R.B.L. said: "The Poppy Appeal is going ahead but the safety and wellbeing of our volunteers, staff and members is paramount". Collectors who fall into the vulnerable category have been advised "not to take part in activity on behalf of the Poppy Appeal that would expose them to any additional risks while coronavirus is still present."

Food banks run or supported by Church of England churches reported rocketing demand during lockdown. Here are just two examples:

Hackney Church in East London was distributing parcels with enough food for 1,000 meals a week at start of lockdown. This figure rose to 8,000 and 9,000 meals a week in June, after the church opened a second food bank. It has since served 120,000 meals.

In Co. Durham, the Shildon Alive food bank, founded by St John's Church, has seen demand surge by 500 percent during lockdown.

Egypt

Egypt tops the Bible Society Scriptures list for 2019.

Bible Society teams worldwide provided almost 3.7 million Scripture items for children last year. More than 1.1 million children's Scriptures were distributed in Egypt alone. This is the largest number for one nation, in a place where ministry with young people is a top priority.

China

A Chinese textbook teaching ethics has used a story from the Gospels — but changed the ending.

The Roman Catholic news agency UCA News reports that the government-run University of Electronic Science and Technology Press has produced a textbook for secondary vocational schools on the subject of "professional ethics and law". The book uses the story of the woman caught in adultery who is presented to Christ by the crowd, from chapter 8 of St John's Gospel. "The crowd wanted to stone the woman to death as per their law. But Jesus said, 'Let the one who has never sinned throw the first stone.' Hearing this, they slipped away one by one."

In St John's Gospel, the story concludes: "When Jesus had lifted up himself, and saw none but the woman, he said unto her, 'Woman, where are those thine accusers? Hath no man condemned thee?' She said, 'No man, Lord.' And Jesus said unto her, 'Neither do I condemn thee: go, and sin no more.'"

The Chinese textbook version, however, states: "When the crowd disappeared, Jesus stoned the sinner to death saying, 'I, too, am a sinner. But if the law could only be executed by men without blemish, the law would be dead.'"

A Roman Catholic layman in China has uploaded the passage on to social media, saying: "I want everyone to know that the Chinese Communist Party has always tried to distort the history of the Church, to slander our Church, and to make people hate our Church."

A Roman Catholic priest, who declined to be named, said that distorting the biblical text was "against morality and the law — so how can we still teach professional ethics with this book?"

UCA News quotes Mathew Wang, a Christian teacher at a vocational school, who confirmed the content, but said that the textbook's content varied from place to place in China.

The work had been reviewed by the Textbook Review Committee for Moral Education in Secondary Vocational Education, he said; observing that it was used to justify Chinese laws.

More parties, fewer meetings

The Bishop of Chester, Mark Tanner, wants to be part of a church that has more parties and fewer meetings - when coronavirus restrictions allow, that is! Why? Because at parties you meet people, and at meetings you meet problems. Here he offers a reflection to mark the beginning of his ministry in the Diocese of Chester.

'But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. Therefore, I say to you: do not worry.'

"This is what Jesus says to us through the scriptures, and yet at the same time the newspapers are full of stories about Brexit confusion; around climate change; around isolation and poverty. Even in the Church newspapers, we are told of declining numbers and parishes closing their doors.

Which way should we look? 'Do not worry' says our Lord: 'the world is chaotic and uncertain' says the media.

'Do not worry'. How can he say that? Is it mere fantastic es-

capism? Well no it isn't. When you look at what he says, it is deep realism.

Christ knows how uncertain the world is. He knows the pain we face. And he challenges us to find peace and purpose in Him in the middle of the storm, not to avoid it. The challenge is to keep looking in two directions, at Christ and at the lost: looking to Him in faithful trust and looking outward in generous service: shaped in worship and shaped for witness. This is the call of Christ on us today.

And as we face this challenge, we will find that He will shape and form us; that we continue to be his beautiful bride, ever fit for purpose however the world might change around us. As we partner with people and agencies of peace and seek to serve,

particularly those who are most vulnerable, those who are abandoned and abused, overlooked and oppressed, we will find, that, as we serve them, we serve Christ, and that we are always shaped for relevant mission in this world.

We look at Christ and we look at the lost because that is what Christ himself did: 'I did not come for those who are well, I came for the sick'.

I ride a motorcycle and one of the golden rules of biking is to look where you're going. That might sound obvious, but I remember being taught as a teenager when I was learning to ride, that the most dangerous thing I could do when I got scared in a corner was to look down at the bike and grip the handlebars tightly. The bike follows the eyes, so I would end up in the mud!

It's the same with following Christ: look where he is pointing. Keep your eyes fixed on Jesus and allow him to lead you and lead us beyond our comfort zone and you will find that he provides all that we need and far more besides. The one who sends us to the least and the lowest and the lost, did not call us merely to survive, but to have life and have it in all its fullness. And that's why I want to be a part of a church that has more parties and fewer meetings, because at parties you meet people, whereas at meetings you meet problems.

The Gospel is full of joy and abundance, but let me draw you back to this central paradox, that that joy and that abundance begins as we take up our cross and follow the one who leads us to the places of brokenness.

So, I tell you: do not worry about

tomorrow, for tomorrow has enough worries of its own. Strive first, strive now, strive here, strive with all you are for the Kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be added to you. And God will bless not only you but us in this diocese, he will bless through us more than we can ask or imagine.

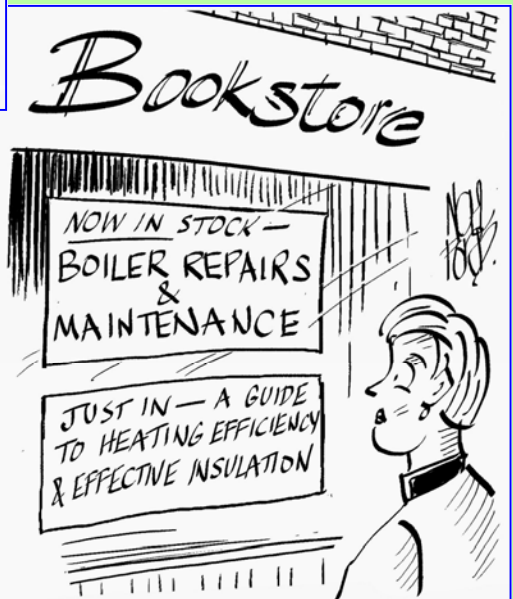
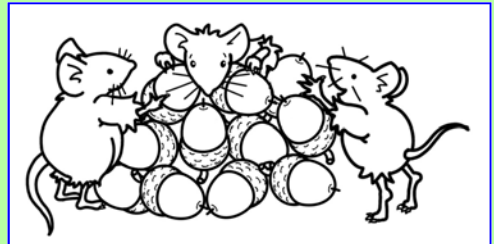

Holy Days

1st November - All Saints and the First Martyrs of Rome

All Saints, or All Hallows, is the feast of all the redeemed, known and unknown, who are now in heaven. When the English Reformation took place, the number of saints in the calendar was drastically reduced, with the result that All Saints' Day stood out with a prominence that it had never had before.

This feast day first began in the East, perhaps as early as the 5th century, as commemorating 'the martyrs of the whole world'.

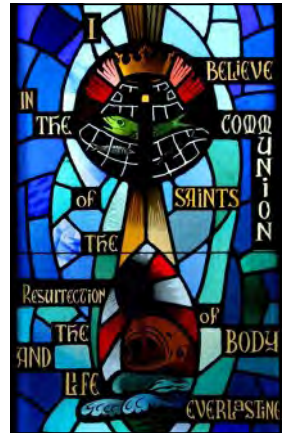
A Northern English 9th century calendar named All Hallows as a principal feast, and such it has remained. Down the centuries devotional writers have seen in it the fulfilment of Pentecost and indeed of Christ's redemptive sacrifice and resurrection.

The saints do not belong to any religious tradition, and their lives and witness to Christ can be appreciated by all Christians. Richard Baxter, writing in the 17th century, wrote the following:

*He wants not friends that hath thy love,
And made converse and walk with thee,
And with thy saints here and above,
With whom for ever I must be...*

*As for my friends, they are not lost;
The several vessels of thy fleet,
Though parted now, by tempests tost,
Shall safely in thy haven meet....*

*The heavenly hosts, world without end,
Shall be my company above;
And thou, my best and surest Friend,
Who shall divide me from thy love?**

The First Martyrs of Rome

The first martyrs of Rome are recorded in the old Roman Martyrology, which states that:

'At Rome, the day is celebrated of very many martyrs, who under the Emperor Nero were falsely charged with the burning of the city and by him were ordered to be slain by various kinds of cruel death; some were covered with the skin of wild beasts, and cast to the dogs to be torn asunder; others were crucified, and then when daylight failed used as torches to illuminate the night. All these were disciples of the apostles and the first fruits of the martyrs whom the Holy Roman Church sent to their Lord before the apostles' death.'

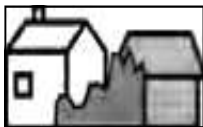
