Remote Education Plan

What is remote education?

There are different definitions out there, but these are the ones we will use here:

Remote education: a broad term encompassing any learning that happens outside of the classroom, with the teacher not present in the same location as the pupils.

Digital remote education: often known as online learning, this is remote learning delivered through digital technologies.

Blended learning: a mix of face-to-face and remote methods. An example would be the 'flipped classroom', where main input happens remotely (for example through video), while practice and tutoring happen in class.

Synchronous education: this is live; asynchronous education is when the material is prepared by a teacher and accessed by the pupil at a later date.

Our offer

At Mottram Church of England Primary School, our overall package is blended learning. We are still teaching full time in school to keyworker children and those who are vulnerable. However, for those parents/carers who are working from home, we are offering synchronous education. This means families have online videos and paper learning to support, this caters for the diverse needs of our families.

We are continuing to follow our progression documents which can be accessed here https://mottram.tameside.sch.uk/curriculum/ for information and support.

The platform we have chosen is the One Drive, which enables parents/carers to access learning for their children when they have the opportunity.

The named persons for the responsibility for the quality and delivery of remote education is Mrs Scattergood and Miss Kirkham. We will be

Lessons planned follow a sequence and are matched to our progression documents. It is the governments expectations that children in Key Stage 1 should do a minimum of 3 hours these are the children in Years 1 and 2. Children in Key Stage 2 should do a minimum of 4 hours, these are the children in Years 3-6.

The online lessons will be either a recording of the teachers in school explaining a concept or teaching a new method or it could be a link to another teacher e.g., Jane Consandine, who takes you step by step through English lessons.

We will be using Oak National Academy, BBC, YouTube – Church of England to provide our collective worship; we are hopeful that Reverend Cait will be providing some assemblies for us to share in the future. Watch this space!

We expect all work to be submitted back to school via the arrangements you have made with your child's teacher.

Assessment and feedback

It is the governments expectations that we have systems for checking daily whether pupils are engaging with work. This is unmanageable for such a small school with a third of the school pupils in. Therefore, we need your help, if your child is not engaging with remote learning, please contact your class teacher and we will formulate a plan with you.

Please return any completed work to the teacher which will be marked. Feedback will be sent via email. If you prefer to take pictures of work and email it for much quicker feedback, please do so.
