






The Invisible

This £1 mini book has been created especially for World Book Day 2023.




Young reporter-in-training Kate and her mouse-accomplice Rupert are on board a train to visit Kate's mum in the Arctic.




Little Lemur Laughing

Who can read and write? How many have access to the internet or have enough food to eat? Does everyone have access to electricity or clean water?
